Dr. Stephen D. White is a Diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Dermatology and a Distinguished Emeritas Professor at the School of Veterinary Medicine at University of California, Davis. Dr. White has thrice been a sabbatical professor at the National School of Veterinary Medicine in Nantes, France. He has served three times as Secretary of the World Congress of Veterinary Dermatology, and is currently the Secretary of the World Association for Veterinary Dermatology. Dr. White has published over 120 scientific papers in refereed journals, including 25 on equine skin disease and 13 on exotic animals, and has lectured in North America, Europe and Asia.

Hal Schott, DVM, PhD

Dr. Schott received his DVM degree in 1984 from The Ohio State University College of Veterinary Medicine, and completing a residency in equine internal medicine and a PhD in equine exercise physiology at Washington State University. Since 1995, Dr. Schott has been an equine medicine clinician at Michigan State University (MSU) with a strong clinical interest in urinary tract disorders and endocrinological disorders, with a focus on pituitary pars intermedia dysfunction. Dr. Schott is a member of the Equine Endocrinology group and was the group leader for preparing the expert opinion document "Recommendations for the Diagnosis and Treatment of Pituitary Pars Intermedia Dysfunction" in 2017 and 2019. Over the past few years Dr. Schott has also developed a strong interest in providing care to working equids in Mexico and developed a two-week program for MSU students to provide care to burros, mules, and horses in rural Mexican communities.

Dr. Fielding is well known to endurance riders for his research into electrolyte and fluid therapy and the author of more than 30 research publications. He attended college at Harvard University where he rode for the equestrian team (jumping). He attended veterinary school at UC Davis, then completed a large animal internship at Texas A&M University. Dr. Fielding began working at Loomis Basin Equine Medical Center in 2003 and is currently one of the owners. Dr. Fielding has over 30 research publications on topics including electrolyte and fluid therapy, emergency medicine, endurance horses, and neonatal foals. He is the co-editor of *Equine Fluid Therapy*, the only textbook focused on fluid and electrolytes in horses. Dr. Fielding received his MBA through the Wharton School, University of Pennsylvania.

Dr. Brosnahan is a Clinical Assistant Professor in Equine Internal Medicine at the Midwestern University Animal Health Institute. Her education includes degrees from Tufts University (DVM), Oklahoma State University (MS), and Cornell University (PhD). She has advanced clinical training through a Large Animal Medicine and Surgery Internship at the University of Minnesota, an Equine Internal Medicine Residency at OSU, and in equine rehabilitation at the University of Tennessee. Dr. Brosnahan's clinical interests include Neonatology, infectious diseases, cardiology, gastrointestinal diseases, exercise physiology and athletic performance, and equine welfare.
